3. Industry Innovation Network

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Manufacturing Industry Innovation Precinct

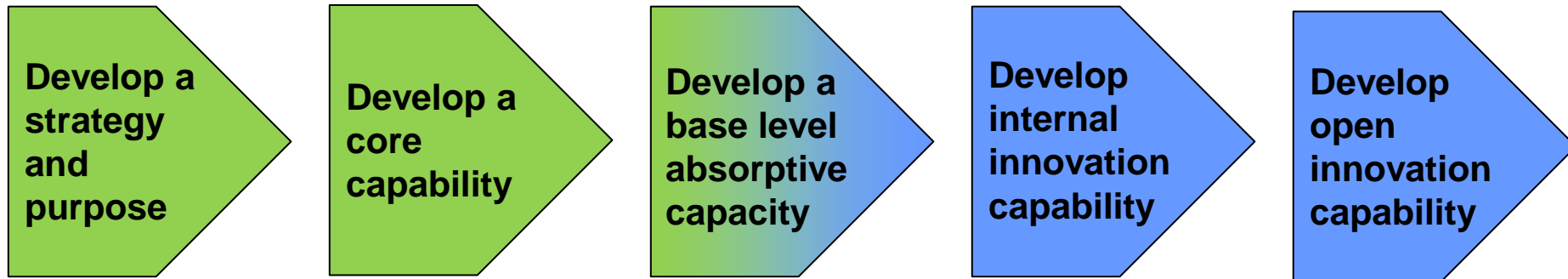
- One of two precincts announced as part of the Industry Innovation Statement *A Plan for Australian Jobs*.
- Industry-led Board chaired by Mr Albert Goller.
- Headquartered in south east Melbourne with a location in South Australia that will support defence manufacturing.
- All activities supported through the Precinct will be available Australia-wide.
- Operational by July 2013 with initial services delivered from May 2013.

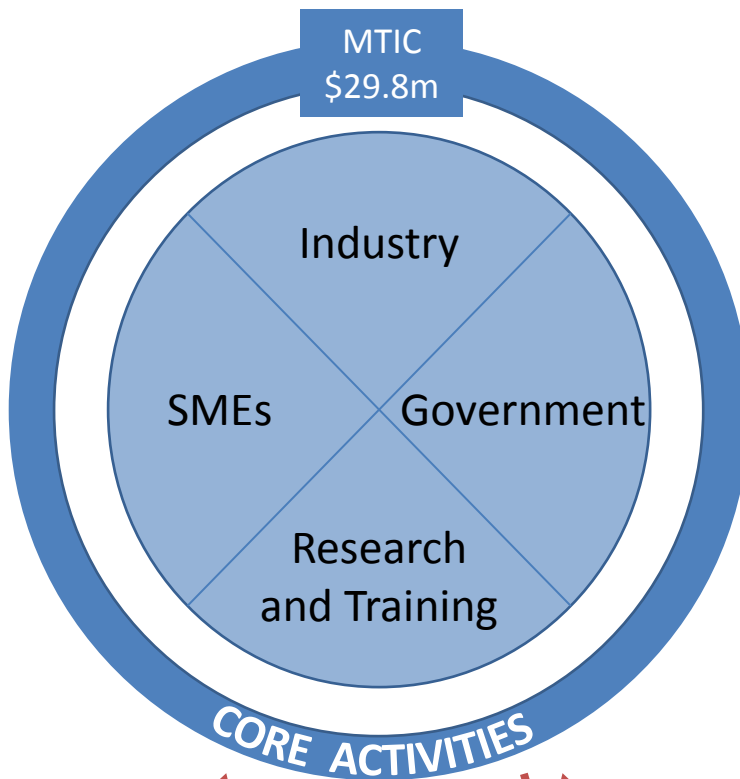

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Industry Innovation Network

- Connect geographically dispersed Precinct members, as well as attracting new members
- Provide a medium for sharing knowledge, best practice and online training tools or frameworks
- Connect organisations across the manufacturing value chain here and abroad.
- Feedback from consultations is being considered in the development of the Network.



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Manufacturing Precinct Participants

- Foundation partners: key groups/orgs who will bring leadership, expertise and a national focus to the Precinct
- Collaboration partners: groups who will link into the Precinct, initially for the purposes of developing a project for the Industry Collaboration Fund
- Companies/SMEs: individual companies who will utilise the Precinct's services and link into Precinct activities.



Collaboration fund

- The Fund will build to \$50 million a year.
- Competitive, merit-based program available only to precincts.
- Objective is to encourage and build on business-led collaborations within precincts that:
 - enhance productivity, growth and international competitiveness.
 - provide returns on investment, positive spill-overs and world best commercial activity.



Consultation plan

1. MTIC consultations prior to announcement
 - June 2012 – February 2013
2. Targeted consultations with key stakeholders (State and Commonwealth Government bodies, key primes and SMEs)
 - February 2013 – April 2013
3. Attendance at key manufacturing/innovation forums
 - February 2013 – April 2013
4. Targeted industry forums
 - March 2013 – April 2013

2. What are the areas that the Manufacturing Precinct should focus on?
3. What activities should the Manufacturing Precinct provide to support these areas?
